Notes about dementia websites:

There are many websites with information about dementia. Important points to consider when evaluating a website include:

- Who sponsors the site?
- What is the purpose of the site?
- Is the information regularly updated and if so by whom?
- Does it cost to 'subscribe' to the site?

Reputable dementia websites will contain general information, but for specific advice about assessments and treatments for your situation contact your GP and other health professionals.
